

## THE CLARK FAMILY TREE

*By Jason A. Kitchin, Cass City, Michigan, April 1959*

My mother, Eva Kitchin, was a granddaughter of Amasa and Roxalana (Carpenter) Clark. She took a great interest in her ancestors and carried on an active correspondence with many of her relatives.

In 1928 after consulting with a few of the first cousins, of whom there were then twenty-eight living of the original sixty, it was decided to hold a reunion at the home of Berton Edgerton in Berlin Township, St. Clair Co., the place where the Clarks first settled in Michigan in 1850.

This gathering was held September 19, 1928 with forty present. Dinner was eaten in the shade of the old willow planted at least seventy-five years before. At the business session Berton was elected President and mother Secretary. These offices they held until called home, mother in 1934, and Berton in 1943.

Between 1928 and 1932 mother did a lot of work compiling records and that year cousin Dorothy Peters typed them for her. I have continued to correspond with many of the relatives and have traveled many miles to meet some of you. In 1946 we made a trip west and while in Washington the cousins there held a reunion where we met sixty cousins for the first time. Then in 1948 we made a special trip to Ohio and Tennessee to contact others. On our trips to Florida the past six winters we have met many more in Tennessee, Alabama, and Florida. These have been very pleasant experiences. Wife and I have met over four hundred of the "kinfolk". It has been an interesting hobby and has turned up a remarkably small percentage of family "skeletons". Some of you have been quite faithful correspondents and have helped me build up the tree to its present size.

After our trip to Washington, cousin Gladys (Aldridge) Williams became interested in becoming a member of the D.A.R. Through Mrs. Lucille Skinner, a research worker of Ypsilanti, Michigan she was able to trace back on great-grandmother's side, the Carpenters, to a little before 1300 in England. The one in the line connected with the Revolution was a Col. Benjamin Carpenter born in Rehoboth, Massachusetts in 1725. He was the great-grandfather of our great-grandmother Roxalana. Yours too if your name is listed in the 4<sup>th</sup> generation in this book. If farther down, add more greats. More will be said of Col. Carpenter later. The nine pages of material which Mrs. Skinner prepared, and a copy of which Gladys sent to me, have added much to our knowledge of this side of the house.

While in Florida and in conversation with a New Englander I was told of a lady in the park from Rehoboth. She gave me the name of a man there whose mother was a Carpenter. I wrote him and soon received a long letter from Joseph C. (the name of my 8<sup>th</sup> great grandfather, his 7<sup>th</sup>, was a younger brother of my 8<sup>th</sup>). Two years later I had another long letter from him. The lady who gave me the name had beaved around with him in their youth and had eaten in the old house built in 1790 where he and thirteen brothers and sisters were raised. This house and four others now stand on the old homestead all occupied by Carpenters.

These are the sources of my information. Of course you will find some mistakes. Some may be in spelling of names, some in dates and more in typing as I never took a lesson or owned a typewriter. So please forgive.

## Amasa Clark, 1812-1893

Amasa Clark was born in Rutland, Vermont in 1812. We do not know anything of his ancestors but do know that he had several brothers and sisters. A cousin Clarice (Howey) Bishop took a bus trip through that region in 1956. She stopped at the Hotel Bardwell in Rutland. Not having transportation she was unable to make contacts but found some eighteen Clark and thirteen Carpenter listings in the telephone directory. Here is a wonderful opportunity for someone with a yen for research and time and money to carry it on.

## Roxalana Carpenter, 1812-1895

Beginning shortly before 1300 and coming down through a line of oft-repeated old English names we have 1<sup>st</sup> John, 2<sup>nd</sup> Richard, 3<sup>rd</sup> John, 4<sup>th</sup> John, 5<sup>th</sup> William, 6<sup>th</sup> James, 7<sup>th</sup> John, 8<sup>th</sup> William, 9<sup>th</sup> William, 10<sup>th</sup> William born in 1576, a resident of London. He came over on the Bevis in 1638 with his son William of the 11<sup>th</sup> generation. William #10 returned on the same ship. William #11, his wife Abigail, and their three sons remained. Four more children were born in America. This family, the 12<sup>th</sup> generation, were these:

Mrs. Skinner who did the research was a descendent of John. We are of Joseph and our Rehoboth cousin is of Samuel.

It is an interesting note that Governor Bradford's first wife, Dorothy, was drowned in the harbor at Plymouth while the ship was at anchorage. For his second wife he married the widow Alice (Carpenter) Southworth. It is supposed that her influence drew her cousin, our ancestor, to America. He and the governor were always very close friends.

Many things of interest are in the records. I shall take time for a few. William #11 was elected to the General Court in Plymouth and in 1643 lived in Weymouth where the twins were born. He contributed 3 lbs. 17 sh. to King Phillip's Indian War. He was also one of the fifty-eight persons who in about 1644 founded Rehoboth, Massachusetts.

His son Joseph (1635-1675) married Margaret Sutton. He was a wheelwright by trade. He was one of seven who helped found and build the first Baptist church in America. For this he was fined five lbs. and forbidden to worship for one month in the Pilgrim church. He had nine children, four born in Rehoboth and five in Swansea. He died at the age of forty and was buried two days after the birth of the youngest, near the 100 acre cave near Barrington.

His son Benjamin (1658-1728) of the 13<sup>th</sup> generation and second of the nine married Renew Weeks by whom he had twelve children. After her death he married Martha Toogood. (Names were odd; one of his girls was named Submit.)

Edward (14<sup>th</sup> generation) youngest of above twelve, married Elizabeth Wilson of Rehoboth. They had six, among them Comfort and Beloved. He died at Swansea.

15<sup>th</sup> Generation – First of the above six was Benjamin (1725-1804). He married Amy Carpenter, a 4<sup>th</sup> cousin, in Providence, Rhode Island. They had eleven children. He had only a common school education but became a man of prominence before moving to Vermont. Much is said of him in Thompson's Romance. Considerable space is devoted to him in Mrs. Skinner's work but I shall let the inscription on his tombstone sum it up.

From a news clipping, date around 1900, found in Friend Palmer's scrapbook in the Burton Library in Detroit. A New Yorker said, "I was up in Vermont and paid a visit to the old Guilford cemetery. On a stone standing in a picturesque obliquity at the head of an overgrown grave I was able to decipher the following."

*"Sacred to the memory of Hon. Benjamin Carpenter Esq. born in Rehoboth Mass. A.D. 1725. A public teacher of righteousness, an able advocate lost for democracy and the equal rights of man. Removed to this town A.D. 1770. Was a field officer in the Revolutionary War. A Founder of the first Constitution and Government of Vermont. A Councilor of Censors in A.D. 1783. A member of the Council and Lieut. Governor of the State, A.D. 1779. A firm professor of Christianity in the Baptist Church for fifty years. Left this world and 146 lineal descendants March 29, 1804, age 78 years, 10 months, and 12 days, with a strong mind and full faith of a more glorious hereafter. His stature about 6 ft, weight 200 lbs. Death had no terror."*

The writer added that it would be to the credit of anyone of the posterity to drop around and fix up the old patriot's grave a little.

The 16<sup>th</sup> generation Samuel (5<sup>th</sup> of the last six) 1787-1858 married Roxy Newton. They had eight children probably born in Ira, Vermont. She died when great-grandmother Roxalana was twelve. He married again and had seven more children. He died in St. Clair Co., Michigan.

With his fourth child we leave the Carpenter line and begin to count from the 1<sup>st</sup> generation of Clarks. To make it easier to see where you fit in we will give their family here.

Recently I received from Eva Smith, Uncle Loren's daughter, a history of the family which he had written in 1935. I did not know of this paper or if I ever did had forgotten it. I found it so interesting that I shall quote it as he wrote it leaving out only some about Col. Benjamin Carpenter which has already been discussed in some detail. Uncle Loren was born when great-grandfather Amasa was 48 and was quite capable of giving us a lot of facts.

Written by Loren Churchill and dedicated to the memory of our Grandparents  
Amasa Clark and Roxalana Carpenter  
February 1935

Dear Cousins,

I am at this date the family historian for the Clark family and by request am writing this. Some of these things I have heard grandfather tell, some mother told me when she was a young woman and I a little boy. Many of them I personally remember.

Amasa Clark was born January 14, 1812 in Rutland, VT. He was one of the younger in a family of eleven. His father was a farmer and owned a farm near Rutland. Near it was a hill known as Clark's hill. But of his ancestry we know nothing more but strongly suspect that there was a time when the Clarks came from the Emerald Isle, the land where the Shamrock glows and the river Shannon flows.

When grandfather was 18 he married Roxalana Carpenter of Ira, VT. She was born May 16, 1812, a direct descendant of one of the oldest families of New England.

[Here we leave out some information given on previous pages about Col. Benjamin Carpenter.]

Joseph, son of Benjamin, was an ordained Baptist minister and also farmed during the week. Samuel his second son was grandmother Clark's father. He married Roxalana Newton. *[Note here, perhaps of interest mostly to Jason Kitchin. She had a brother Jason and Jason Kitchin was the fifth Jason, the name coming down on the mother's side. Newton, Carpenter, Clark, Churchill, Kitchin.]* They had a family of eight when she died of cancer. Our grandmother also named Roxalana after her mother was twelve at the time. She remembered how her mother sat in a chair and held to the rungs with nothing to deaden the pain while the doctor operated on her. After her death he (Samuel) married again and they had seven children. In 1836 they came to Michigan by way of Ohio and settled in Berlin Township where he died February 22, 1864. *[Note from RGS: Other records indicate date of death to be 2/22/1858.]* Lynthia, his second wife died April 28, 1867. They were buried in Hover cemetery in East Berlin. His son Samuel Jr. settled the estate and erected a large monument to his father's memory.

The first twenty years of our grandparent's married life they moved often. They went wherever he could find work, mostly on farms. In harvest time he took jobs cutting grain. There were no combines, self-binders or reapers, not even a cradle. They cut the grain with a sickle even as in the days of Boaz when Ruth gleaned in the fields. In the winter he would thresh out the farmer's grain with a flail. Eleven children were born in Vermont. Two died in infancy. One son Pearl was born in Michigan.

They must have had a hard time to get along with a large family and wages so low. Sometimes he worked all day for a peck of rye. Vermont was very frosty and rye grew better than wheat. They would grind the rye and mix the dark flour with corn meal and make a kind of bread commonly called rye and Injun.

In 1850 grandfather and his family moved to Michigan where he could get land of his own. They came by way of the Erie Canal and the boat was drawn by horses which walked on a path on the bank. (Perhaps the horse was driven by the future President Garfield, though by that date he would be 19 and may have graduated from that job.) They came to Berlin Township where her father and the Churchills too from Canada had settled about fourteen years earlier.

He soon found 80 acres of State land in section 27 which could be had. But the land office was in Detroit over fifty miles away and grandfather had no horse. Another man who had a horse wanted the same piece of land, so a race was on. By dint of long hours and hard going grandfather won the race and obtained the land. Soon afterwards he built a good sized log house. Like most log houses it was not far from the upper floor to the eaves. I well remember where I used to sleep up under the roof in the southeast corner and grandmother's homemade flannel (wool) sheets. How they could scratch! I can now close my eyes and fancy I hear the rain pattering on the roof.

There stood the old spinning wheel and the reel where she and the girls would spin and reel off the yarn. The loom was also there and they would weave the cloth which was then taken to Almont to be fulled. It was then ready to be made into "homespun" clothes.

One way he had of making money was by making charcoal. I remember the last he made on the farm. Trees were cut up like cordwood and the pieces stood on end, the tops leaning a little to the center so they would stand solid as it was built up in a circle. When it was large enough another circle of wood was put on top only this one was smaller. An even smaller bunch of wood was placed on top to form a point. The whole resembled an Indian wigwam in shape. It was then covered with sod to keep it clean and then covered with earth to keep out the air. A hole was left in one side to start the fire. When the fire was started the hole was carefully closed. Grandfather had to watch it for seven or eight days to see that the fire did not break through. The result was charcoal which he sold to the drugstores, the blacksmiths and the neighbors.

Another source of income was shearing sheep. The boys did what they could at it as soon as they were old enough. Sheep were very plentiful around East Almont as it was a Scotch settlement. Often they would have several hundred sheep on a farm. I have heard him tell of places where they would shear the sheep that the wealthy Scotchmen would cook goose eggs for them and cut them in half. Never would they get hens eggs. They were worth six cents a dozen.

No matter how long I live I shall never forget the corn he grew over on the old farm. The ground was low and fertile. He would make a scarecrow and when blackbirds or cutworms did get some of the corn he was right there to transplant some from another hill so he would have a perfect stand.

And while he knew nothing of modern methods of caring for bees and honey he proved very successful with them. I remember how he wore a red and black checkered shirt as he went out to hive. When the bees swarmed he didn't use any gloves or bee-bonnet but merely rolled his sleeves up above his elbows and lit his clay pipe which had two-thirds of the stem off and the bowl wrong side up. Then he was ready. He would gather them up in his bare hands like you would little chicks, yet they never seemed to sting him. The greater part of his income was from the sheep and bees.

As the years went by he bought cattle and sheep. The latter were from the flock of A. D. Taylor of Romeo and were originally from Vermont. The farm was sold in 1870 and he then bought 160 acres in Freemont Township, Sanilac County, six miles northeast of Yale. There was a good barn, a log house and a good sized clearing as well as a beech and maple woods. The south side of the farm had been cleared for pasture and there was a stream of never failing water running through it which furnished water for the stock as well as for the family until a well was dug. Here again he set out a large orchard and gave it wonderful care. Each year he would take a dull knife and scrape the trunk to take off the rough bark and any place where insects could

hide. They were then white-washed and the trees carefully trimmed. Once in a while he would cut a slit in the bark from the lower limbs to the ground. The new bark was smooth and beautiful and the trees grew fast.

A new house was built with a basement. Then he put away the old cradle and bought a mowing machine and a reaper and one by one they surrounded themselves with the comforts of life as known in that day. They prepared to spend their declining years in peace and comfort.

In 1884 their second son Jason who was a veteran of the Civil War and had marched with Sherman on the famous March to the Sea, decided to move to the South. He had spent some time in Tennessee and had learned to like its milder climate. Perhaps boyhood memories of Vermont's mountains and his wife's health helped in making the decision. He sold his farm at auction and went to Tennessee. A little later his brothers Samuel Newton and Dallas followed him. Then in an evil hour grandfather decided to follow the boys. After the boys had been there a while things did not look so rosy and they wrote him not to be in a hurry but to wait awhile. I remember what he said. "I guess they want us to come alright." They sold the place at auction and taking a carload of things with them in their mid-seventies left for a strange land. The land agents were going to sell them 1,500 acres for \$500 down but were unable to give a clear title. Then Uncle Newton got a small farm and grandfather another. They built a house on it but soon tired of the country. Grandmother came back for a visit and soon after her return both she and grandfather moved back to Michigan poorer but wiser. They bought a small place south of the fairgrounds at Yale just across the road from their son Lester. They built another house and seemed very contented.

Uncle Newton and Uncle Dallas soon came back and settled for a time at Yale. (*Note by Jason Kitchin: According to mother's records Uncle Newton had an itching foot as he lived at various times later in Alabama, Florida, Washington, and Alberta, Canada, finally spending his last years in Michigan dying at the home of his daughter Esther Edgerton in Berlin Township.*) During the winter of 1898 while feeding the hens he (grandfather Amasa) slipped on the ice and broke his hip. It would not heal. He suffered for a year before death came in March 1893. My mother (Evaline C.) was with him most of that year helping to care for him. Grandmother visited around some and then went to live with my mother. She was there a year when she took pneumonia and though all loving hands could do for her was done she passed away to meet her Father in heaven March 10, 1895. Eva Kitchin and myself stood beside her as she passed on. It was their request that they be laid away at West Berlin where two of their daughters were but because of deep drifted snow which made it unfit they were buried at Yale.

As to their Christian lives I hesitate to try to tell you. Their home church was the Methodist Protestant. To use the language of today they were live wires. When I was a small boy and went to visit them they were living at Yale. In the morning he and the boys went to the barn to do chores while grandmother got breakfast ready. Then she would set it in the oven to keep warm. When all were ready for breakfast he would take the Bible and read a chapter, now and then stopping to make comments on it. Then he would start a hymn, all would join in; then they would bow at the family altar. He seemed to be able to talk to his Father in heaven. His trust and faith were strong in God. No matter what the circumstances were, family worship came first. As far back as I can recall they were traveling toward the City that looks over the Valley of Death and whose beauties may never be told, where the sun never sets and the leaves never fade.

I have heard him tell of revivals where strong men were determined not to be saved and would hang on to the seats to keep from going to the altar, but a stronger power than their own would draw them away. We do not see men saved that way today. He had a quiet spirit and kind disposition.

In the year 1850 at the age of thirty-eight, with their nine living children, they came to Michigan traveling on a towboat on the Erie Canal. Here they settled on a piece of land near Smith's Creek, now Allenton in Berlin Township, St. Clair Co. At that time it was a forested wilderness with Indians for neighbors. Lester was seventeen and I have heard him tell how homesick he became for the mountains. Here he was so shut in that the only way to see the sky was to look up. Grandfather took great pleasure in caring for his bees and sheep.

After living a few years in St. Clair Co. they sold out and bought a place east of Yale and south of Roseburg in Sanilac Co. Then in 1884 at the age of seventy-eight they again sold and went to Tennessee where three of their sons had gone. Jason had spent some time there while serving in the Union Army. Because of his wife's poor health he had decided to try a warmer climate. Dallas and Samuel Newton went also. Our great-grandparents were very much dissatisfied and soon returned to Michigan. They bought a piece of land near their son Lester near Yale. Here they lived until grandfather's death in 1893. He had fallen and broken his hip, the injury caused his death. Grandmother lived with her daughters the next two years. She died at the Churchill home. Her illness was short and was diagnosed as congestion of the lungs. Just a week before she had attended a revival service at the McHugh schoolhouse where her son Lester was preaching. Her last testimony was long remembered by many.

Since we have traveled in Tennessee and seen many desirable features, we certainly would not call it the jumping off place. It seems to me if I had been raised there it would still be Home Sweet Home to me. And yet the descendants of those families have scattered much more than all the others put together. Whether for economic reasons or an inherited spirit of adventure I cannot say but my addresses for these are in twenty different states.

We have tried this winter to bring our records as up to date as possible. There are a few families for whom I have not been able to get an address. Then too I have sent out over thirty letters and have received sixteen replies. So if you find some places incomplete you have the reason. In the years ahead while I am spared I plan to include in the newsletter form of invitation some information that is up to date so that you who have a copy may file it in the back.
